

## PSALM 2; June 6; Psalm of King Jesus

### ANALYSIS:

1. At whom does the LORD laugh in this Psalm? \_\_\_\_\_
2. What do the heathen people, their kings and rulers purpose to do against the LORD? \_\_\_\_\_
3. According to Acts 13:33-34 what glory of Christ is being pointed out by quoting, "Thou art my Son; this day have I begotten thee?"  
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4. What will Jesus ask for and receive according to this Psalm?  
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5. What instruction is given to the kings & judges of the earth?  
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### THINGS TO THINK ABOUT:

This chapter exalts the Lord Jesus Christ after it speaks of David, and is therefore called a Messianic Psalm. How do we know this? The words, "Thou art my Son; this day have I begotten thee" (v 7) are quoted in Acts 13:33 as referring to Christ's resurrection. These words are also in Heb 1:5 with reference to His incarnation. And again in Heb 5:5 they point to the glory of Christ's high priestly ministry for His people. What a wonderful expression, about our glorious Savior!

Let us never despair at the seeming reign of evil and wickedness in the earth, for God is simply letting rebellious mankind prove their dessert by their deeds. "Then ..." (v 5) assures us that the LORD is in absolute control, and in His perfect fullness of time, He will come in certain wrath and judgment on the ungodly. Take courage and keep looking up!

### HELP:

1. The heathen, people, kings of the earth, rulers (vs 1-20).
2. Let us break their bands asunder, and cast away their cords from us (v 3).
3. Jesus being raised from the dead (v 7 with Acts 13:33-34).
4. The heathen for thine inheritance, and the uttermost parts of the earth for thy possession (v 8).
5. Serve the LORD with fear, and rejoice with trembling. Kiss the Son, lest He be angry (vs 11-12).
